



## AEP executives informal discussion provides insight to WiNUP members

Two top women executives from AEP shared their insights with Ohio Chapter members July 16.

Holly Koeppel, executive vice president and chief financial officer, and Helen Murray, AEP Indiana Michigan president and chief operating officer, talked about relationships, their utility beginnings and lessons they have learned.

Top on the list of questions was "what is the value of an organization such as WiNUP?" Other topics included what is the reaction in your hometowns to your success; what are the implications of big name tennis recently paying men and women equally; why is sustainability an important business factor and what do you wish you had paid more attention to during your careers?

"Relationships" was the key word both Koeppel and Murray cited when talking about the importance of professional organizations such as WiNUP. Both agreed "the relationships you build through your contacts here are invaluable."

Murray noted women need to network more among women and believe in themselves and in one another. "If there is anything we can do for one another, it is believing we can be anything we want to be," Murray said.
